The 'Work Crew' Program Contributing to the Community

Over the span of the last eight school weeks the students involved in Monaro High Schoo's 'Work Crew' program made fortnightly visits to the Monaro Retirement Villas with the aim of improving the gardens and grounds of the estate. The students voluntarily gave their time and effort performing tasks that included mulching garden beds in each of the twelve villas and the surrounding grounds, trimming trees and bushes, weeding gardens prior to munching, pruning plants and removing general green waste. The result was a remarkable transformation of the estate and the elderly residents repeatedly expressed their sincere appreciation for what the students were able to do for them and how they felt better about the way their homes presented.

The wonderful work attitudes, application to the various tasks, teamwork and sense of giving back to their community were remarkable aspects to see in these young people as they went about providing some goodness into the lives of the elderly residents. A big thank you must also go to Rachel Hawkins, one of our school's Student Learning Support Officers, who brought her gardening expertise to the project and was able to advise the student on the finer points of garden management and maintenance.

After having previously done almost two years of work at the Sir William Hudson Memorial Centre, until a change of management brought to an end our involvement, it was very rewarding to again associate the 'Work Crew' program with the community and allow our students to see what they are actually capable of, gain experience and confidence in themselves, and to get an impression of what awaits them when their time at school comes to an end and it is their turn to enter the "real" world.

I am very proud of these students for what they achieved, how they conducted and applied themselves and for how they represented Monaro High School and showed the best of what our school is trying to achieve.

Learning from Home



On Friday 27 August the Premier announced the road map for return to face to face learning at school. This return to school will all depend on our LGA lockdown status.


